Introduction

Reflection Questions

Prioritizing Personal Interactions

1. What steps can you take to be a better listener and communicator?

3. When have you experienced the joy of an open and heartfelt conversation?

Celebrating Fellowship

1. How does gathering with others in faith encourage you?
2. What traditions or activities bring joy and unity to your relationships?
3. How can you share and celebrate the gift of fellowship with others?



Section 1: Interactive Activities

Activity 1: Fellowship Connection Map

Objective: Visualize and reflect on your network of relationships and the importance of face-to-face interactions.

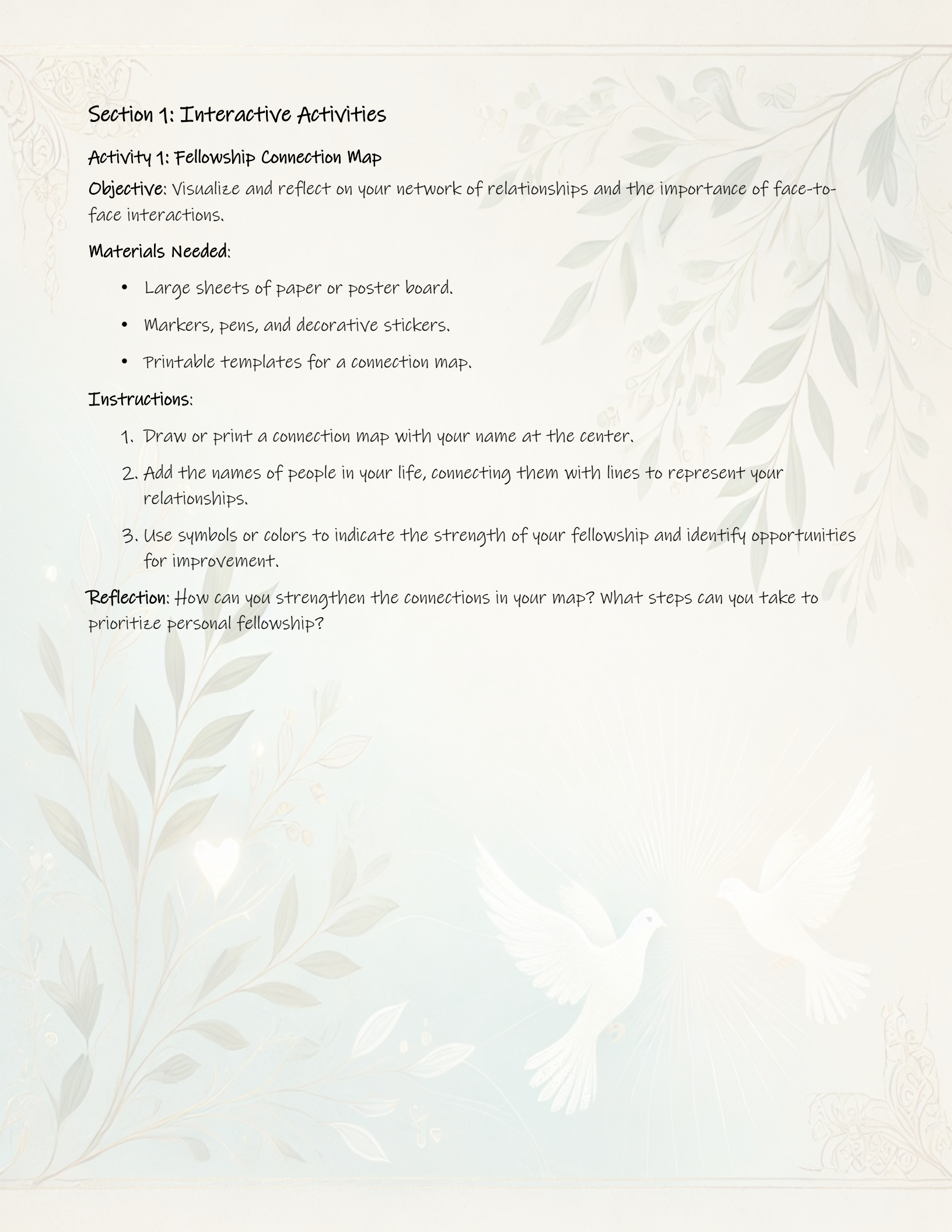
Materials Needed:

- Large sheets of paper or poster board.
- Markers, pens, and decorative stickers.
- Printable templates for a connection map.

Instructions:

1. Draw or print a connection map with your name at the center.
2. Add the names of people in your life, connecting them with lines to represent your relationships.

Objective: Foster meaningful conversations in a group setting through guided discussion and active listening.

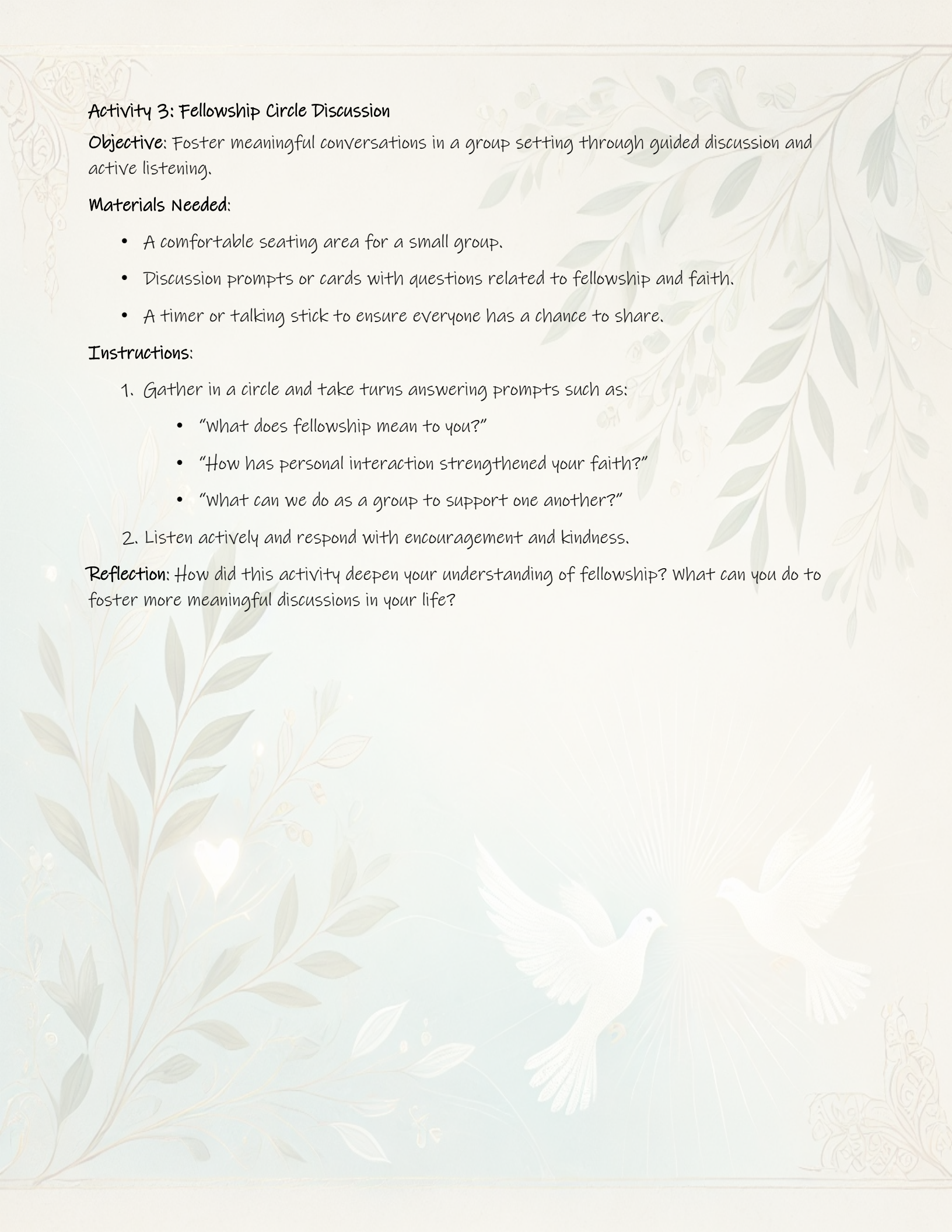
Materials Needed:

- A comfortable seating area for a small group.
- Discussion prompts or cards with questions related to fellowship and faith.
- A timer or talking stick to ensure everyone has a chance to share.

Instructions:

1. Gather in a circle and take turns answering prompts such as:
 - "What does fellowship mean to you?"
 - "How has personal interaction strengthened your faith?"
 - "What can we do as a group to support one another?"
2. Listen actively and respond with encouragement and kindness.

Reflection: How did this activity deepen your understanding of fellowship? What can you do to foster more meaningful discussions in your life?

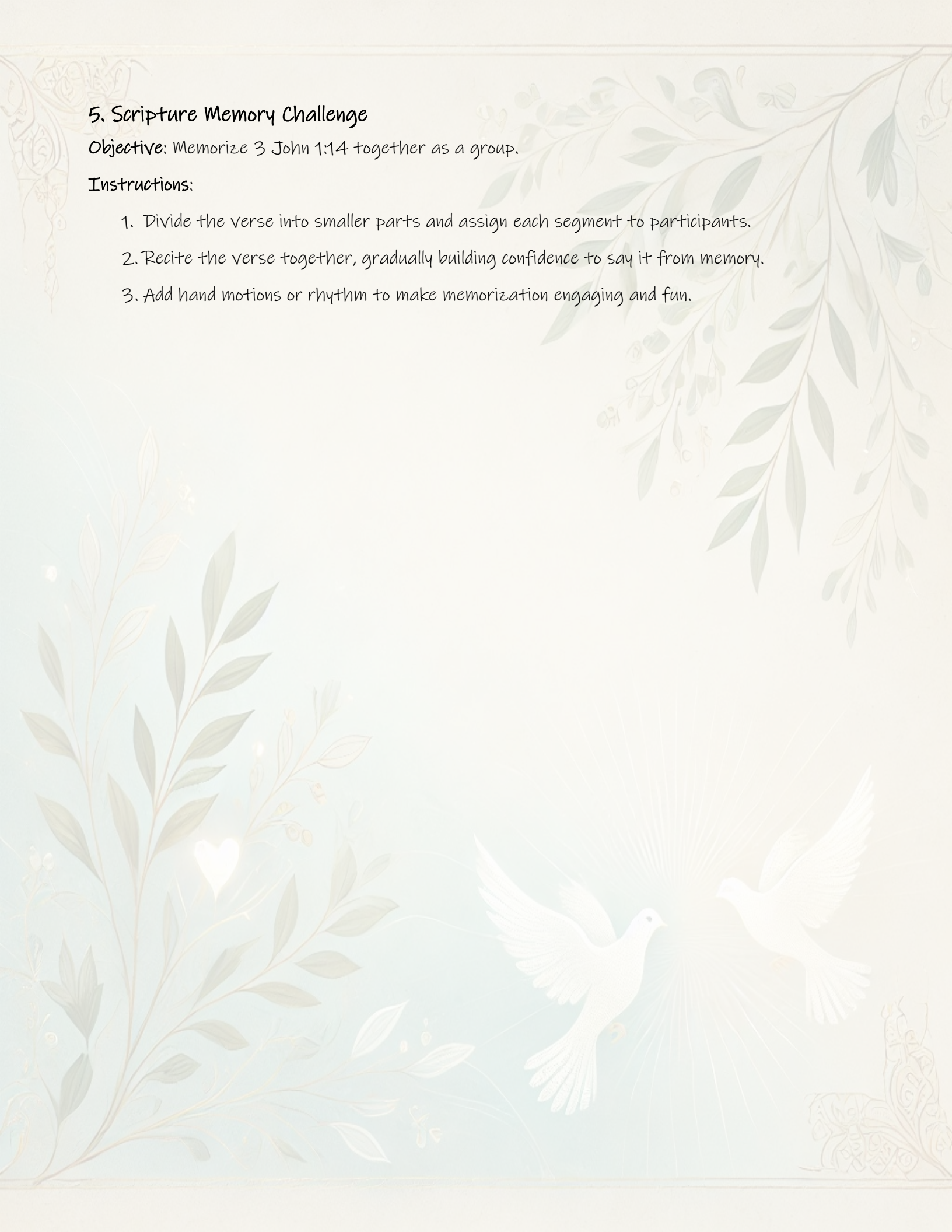


5. Scripture Memory Challenge

Objective: Memorize 3 John 1:14 together as a group.

Instructions:

1. Divide the verse into smaller parts and assign each segment to participants.
2. Recite the verse together, gradually building confidence to say it from memory.
3. Add hand motions or rhythm to make memorization engaging and fun.



6. Practical Applications

Daily Fellowship Journal

Instructions:

1. Write daily reflections on how you practiced face-to-face fellowship and meaningful communication.
2. Note moments where your interactions brought joy or encouragement to others.

Family Fellowship Guide

Structure:

- Monday: Pray for opportunities to connect with others face to face.
- Tuesday: Reflect on how personal interactions have strengthened your relationships.
- Wednesday: Thank God for the gift of fellowship and community.
- Thursday: Pray for boldness and humility in building meaningful connections.
- Friday: Share experiences of fellowship and mutual encouragement with family.
- Saturday: Celebrate joyful moments of connection with loved ones.
- Sunday: Recommit to prioritizing personal fellowship in your walk of faith.



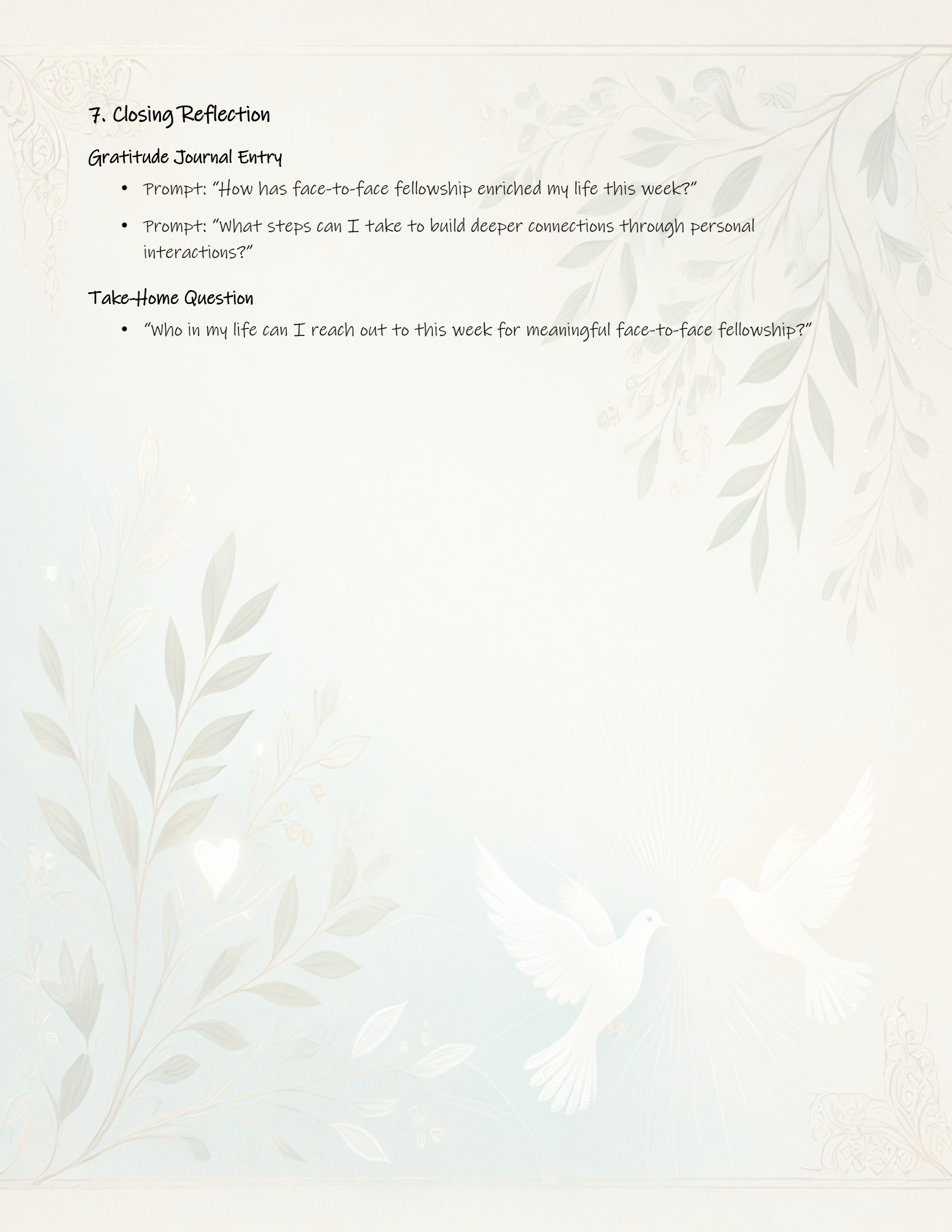
7. Closing Reflection

Gratitude Journal Entry

Take-Home Question

- "Who in my life can I reach out to this week for meaningful face-to-face fellowship?"



8. Bonus Content

Printable Coloring Page

Encouragement Cards
