

Time Audit Chronicles: Paul's Authority and the True Gospel (Galatians 1:1-10)

Prologue: Paul's Urgent Letter to Galatia

The Presswood family gathered around, opening Paul's letter to the Galatians. The first chapter was filled with urgency and authority, as Paul passionately defended the gospel of **Jesus Christ**. Ariel had been reflecting on the dangers of false teachings and how easily people could be led astray. Alice, cuddling Mr. Fluffernutter, was imagining Paul sitting at a desk, writing his letter with determination.

"Daddy," Ariel asked, "Why was Paul so upset in this part of the letter? What does he mean by a 'different gospel'?"

The Journey Begins: Paul Defends His Authority (Galatians 1:1-5)

"Paul, an apostle, not of men, neither by man, but by Jesus Christ, and God the Father, who raised him from the dead..." (Galatians 1:1).

Ryan pointed to Paul as he wrote. "Paul starts by reminding the Galatians that his apostleship wasn't given to him by any human being—it came directly from **Jesus Christ**. He wanted them to understand that his authority to preach the gospel wasn't man-made, but divinely appointed."

Ariel watched as Paul carefully chose his words. "So, Paul was saying, 'You can trust what I'm telling you, because it's not my message—it's God's message.'"

A Different Gospel: Paul’s Warning (*Galatians 1:6-9*)

He wrote, “**I marvel that ye are so soon removed from him that called you into the grace of Christ unto another gospel: which is not another; but there be some that trouble you, and would pervert the gospel of Christ.**” (Galatians 1:6-7).

The Galatians were **turning away** from the gospel so quickly, even though they had already experienced the grace of Christ. He’s warning them that there isn’t any other gospel—there’s only one truth, and anything else is a distortion.”

Ariel’s face grew serious. “So, the false teachers were taking the gospel and twisting it into something it wasn’t? That’s dangerous.”

“Yes,” Ryan said, “and that’s why Paul’s tone is so urgent. He knew that a distorted gospel wasn’t just misleading—it was deadly. That’s why Paul doesn’t hold back when he says, ‘**If any man preach any other gospel unto you than that ye have received, let him be accursed.**’” (Galatians 1:9).

The Key Teaching: Salvation by Grace Through Faith (*Galatians 1:8-10*)

Paul’s final point in this section was clear: “**For do I now persuade men, or God? or do I seek to please men? for if I yet pleased men, I should not be the servant of Christ.**” (Galatians 1:10).

Ariel watched as Paul underlined his loyalty to God above all else. “Paul is saying that he’s not here to make people happy or tell them what they want to hear—he’s here to serve God and preach the truth.”

“That’s right,” Ryan said. “Paul knew that standing for the truth would make him unpopular with some people, but he didn’t care. His priority was **pleasing God**, not people. He wasn’t willing to compromise the gospel to make it more acceptable or comfortable for anyone.”

Ariel smiled. “So, Paul wasn’t afraid to speak the truth, even if it meant upsetting people or facing opposition. He knew the **gospel** was too important to water down.”

“Exactly,” Ryan said. “Paul was completely committed to the **truth** because he knew that the gospel is the only way for people to experience **salvation**. His passion came from his love for God and for the people he was writing to. He wanted to protect them from the lies that could lead them astray.”

Reflections in the Garage

Takeaway: Guarding the Truth of the Gospel

In **Galatians 1:1-10**, Paul begins his letter with a passionate defense of the **gospel**. He asserts that his apostleship comes directly from **Jesus Christ**, not from human authority, and warns the Galatians against turning to a **different gospel**. Paul’s words remind us that the gospel is unchanging: **salvation comes by grace through faith in Jesus Christ alone**.

This passage teaches us to be vigilant against false teachings that distort the gospel and to hold firmly to the truth of God’s Word. Paul’s example also encourages us to prioritize **pleasing God** over pleasing people, standing boldly for the truth of the gospel even when it’s difficult. Ultimately, the gospel is the foundation of our faith, and guarding its truth is essential to living as faithful followers of **Jesus Christ**.
