

Expanded Report: Be Holy (1 Peter 1:13-25)

Prologue: The Call to Holiness

As the family gathered for their evening Bible study, Ryan opened to 1 Peter 1:13-25. In this passage, Peter calls believers to live holy lives, reflecting the holiness of God in their actions, thoughts, and attitudes. He emphasizes that the foundation of this call to holiness is the redemption believers have received through Christ's sacrifice. Redemption through Christ calls us to live differently, with hearts of love, purity, and devotion to God’s will.

Ryan summarized, “Peter teaches us that our redemption through Christ should result in a life of holiness. This means living in a way that reflects God’s character, showing love to others, and relying on His Word to guide our every step.”

Practical Applications: Living in Holiness

The family discussed how they could apply these teachings in their daily lives:

1. Living with Intentionality and Purity:

Ariel suggested, “I can make sure my actions and thoughts are aligned with God’s Word, and focus on being kind to others, even when it’s hard.”
