

Time Audit Chronicles: Warnings from Israel's History

(1 Corinthians 10:1-13)

Prologue: Learning from the Past

The Presswood family sat together, reading 1 Corinthians 10:1-13, where Paul uses the history of Israel's wilderness journey to warn the church in Corinth about the dangers of idolatry, immorality, and grumbling. Ariel, deep in thought, wondered how stories from the Old Testament applied to her life today.
