

Time Audit Chronicles: The Samaritan Woman at the Well

(John 4:1-42)

Prologue: Breaking Barriers and Offering Living Water

The Presswood family sat around the table, their hearts full as they explored John 4:1-42, the story of Jesus and the Samaritan woman at the well.
