

Time Audit Chronicles: Teaching on Prayer

(Luke 11:1-13)

Prologue: The Power of Prayer

The Presswood family gathered in their cozy living room, ready for another adventure through time. Ariel had just finished reading **Luke 11:1-13**, where Jesus teaches His disciples how to pray. The passage includes the **Lord's Prayer** and an encouragement to **persist in prayer**. Ariel was deep in thought, reflecting on how important prayer is and how it connects us with God. The Lord's Prayer: A Simple but Profound Model (Luke 11:2-4)
