

Expanded Report: Teaching Sound Doctrine (Titus 2:1-10)

Prologue: The Importance of Sound Doctrine in Everyday Life

As the family gathered for their evening study, Ryan opened the Bible to Titus 2:1-10. In this passage, Paul gives Titus clear instructions on how to teach sound doctrine to various groups within the church. Exhort servants to be obedient unto their own masters, and to please them well in all things; not answering again; Not purloining, but shewing all good fidelity; that they may adorn the doctrine of God our Saviour in all things.”
