

Time Audit Chronicles: The Annunciation

(Luke 1:26-38)

Prologue: The Message of Hope

The Presswood family was gathered in the cozy living room, their evening winding down. Ariel had been reading Luke 1:26-38, the story of the angel Gabriel's visit to Mary to announce that she would conceive the Son of God. Her mind was buzzing with thoughts, and Alice, holding Mr. Fluffernutter, was quietly listening, sensing the weight of the moment.

Mary’s willingness to embrace God’s will shows us what true discipleship looks like—humble, obedient faith in the promises of God, no matter the cost.
